LSC Elections Coming Up

The most successful school councils are those that integrate the school and the community. Having a neighborhood school that interacts with the community is advantageous to both. Voting for the Council is an important part of making this happen.

Who can vote: Anyone age 18 or over who lives in the school district can vote. You do not have to have children in the local school or be a citizen or registered voter. You do have to have two pieces of identification (one with your current address).

When and where: Thursday, April 17, 6:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m., Waters School, 4540 North Campbell,

The voting process: Six parent and two community representatives are elected by community members within the school area. Two teacher representatives are elected by the school's faculty. You may cast up to five votes for any combination of parent and community candidates; for example, one community and four parent members, or two community and three parent members. However, if you vote for more than five candidates, your ballot is spoiled and will not count.

Show your commitment to the community by coming out to vote in the Local School Council Elections. It's simple and effective.

Update on Waters

Work has already begun inside the building to update flooring and lighting, but the real change will come this spring and summer as the exterior of the school will get a complete make-over.

The sea of asphalt will be replaced with a campus park, including a multi-purpose turf sports field. The wrought iron fence will be replaced, playground equipment updated, and a new Arts & Music Annex will be built, which will include a dedicated lunch room—look for an official announcement from Alderman Schulner's office.

The first few warm days have already appeared, and with them, more exposure to your neighbors.

Most complaints are about noise and failure to pick up after dogs. Ideally, we would be able to work things out reasonably, but if that's not possible, there are alternatives.

If your neighbor makes excessive amounts of noise (such as a loud car engine in a garage) for an unreasonably long time, you CAN call the police. Per CAPS personnel, beat officers are happy to check out disturbances and help restore peace. Phone 911 and describe the situation. It is helpful to talk to the officers before they address the nuisance-creator to give background information, but not necessary. You can request the call to be anonymous.

City Ordinance 7-12 states that "no owner shall fail to remove excrement deposited by his/her pet upon the public ways or within the public places of the city or upon the premises of any person other than the owner without that person's consent. Violators can be fined." Ordinance 7-12-030 states that animals shall be restrained. This means a leash no longer than six feet.

You can call 311 to report any violations, and if you can describe the dog and where it lives, an officer will make a house call.
